



They also root for the Yankees, 49ers, Warriors, and Kansas City Chiefs. th





Nikki was raised in Eagle Point, Oregon and attended elementary school and high school there, graduating from Eagle Point High in 1989. On July 30, 1994, in Shady Cove, Oregon, Nikki married Antonio Cornell Carter. They had a son, Dominik Latrell Carter, who survives. The couple later divorced.

Beat milk and eggs


Layer half of chiles in rectangular dish, then half the cheese and repeat.

Bake 350 for 30 min. Good with rice, beans and salsa.







lifestyles - FROM RURAL TO ACTIVE

A Trip to the Heart of the Rogue Valley: Medford, Oregon - from sunset.com Written by J.D. Simkins in Partnership with Travel Medford


Come spring and summer, Oregon becomes a warm-weather wonderland that beckons travelers with promises of cooling evergreen forests, high deserts, rushing rivers, and rugged coastline blanketed in greens and bursts of flora. It is also home to one of the most diverse and rewarding destinations in the West: Medford, the accessible beating heart of southern Oregon's Rogue Valley, where traffic is a memory in the rearview mirror and an international airport makes navigation a breeze.



This is where I spent a week immersed in undulating foothills, horseshoe-shaped Table Rock islands in the sky, and bustling waterways. With the sparkling new Compass Hotel by Margaritaville serving as my base of operations, I embarked on a taste test of Medford's adventures spanning water, earth, and sky.

Life on the Water

The Medford region is a Mecca for outdoor recreation, much of it centering on the water. Fly fishing is a staple of the Rogue River, but for adrenaline-seekers, white-water rafting and high-speed options, such as tours led by Rogue Jet Boat Adventures, hurl and spin passengers through stretches of river flanked by overhanging trees, historic homes, and a smorgasbord of wildlife. "Theodore Roosevelt once stayed in that home there," my boat's guide said, motioning toward a charming cottage that now sits backdropped by a colossal home boasting designs worthy of a rustic resort. "And over there is Jim Belushi's house," he continued, slowing his speed to prompt a 360degree spin that sent each guest row into a chorus of excited screams. A midpoint pit stop landed our boat at Discovery Park, owned and operated by the tour company. Here, a lake, outdoor bar, game areas, and a floating music stage marked the beginning stages of what Jet Boat Adventures will soon turn into a completed glamping site and recreation area.





I traveled alone to Rwanda and Uganda. I hired a reputable, but in-country tour company to tailor-make my trip, seeing only the things I truly wanted to see. (It wasn't a package.) I had two drivers--one in Rwanda and when I crossed the border into Uganda, I had another. Both were good drivers, knowledgeable and fun!

When: Dec. 2-18, 2022 (approx. 16 days)

Why? As a photographer, I especially love African animals. I've been to 10 African countries now. My childhood dream had always been to see gorillas in the wild. I was fortunate to go on two gorilla treks while there: once in Rwanda and once in Uganda, as well as a Chimp trek, a Golden Monkey trek, and several safaris in Queen Elizabeth NP and Murchison Falls. The hike to see the gorillas in Rwanda has to be one of my favorite lifetime experiences! (I have also been lucky enough to witness the Great Migration in the Masa Mara, Kenya, where the animals cross the river in the thousands, which has also been tops on my "glad I went" list.)

Where did I stay: I mostly stayed in safari lodges throughout Rwanda and Uganda and a few small hotels near bigger cities.

Cuisine: All my meals were delicious. There was always an abundance of fresh vegetables and fruits on every plate! I drew the line at fried grasshoppers, however.

Activities: Mostly wildlife, but I loved going on cultural walks in several villages in both countries (learning how coffee was roasted, banana beer was made, basket weaving, grain grinding, wood carving, etc.), visiting the Diann Fossey Museum, and the Kings Palace Museum in Rwanda. I did a canopy walk on a suspension bridge over the Nyungwe Forest. the most powerful waterfall in the world).



I took two boat trips down the Kazinga Channel and Nile River (to Murchison Falls-considered the most powerful waterfall in the world).

I went to a sanctuary where rhinos were protected (since most in Uganda have sadly been poached but are being re-introduced). I also visited two genocide museums in Kigali. A highlight for me was visiting a school for the deaf in Rwanda. (I had been communicating with their headmaster for several years.) As a former teacher of the deaf and sign language interpreter, this was tops on my list. The children greeted me with drum dances and I was warmly welcomed.

Local Culture: The people in both Rwanda and Uganda are friendly, open, hardworking, and welcoming. I felt safe everywhere I went. Hardly anyone has a car, so most people walked along the dirt roads. A common childhood chore is walking to the river or creek with a large yellow container to collect the family's daily water supply. Both are agricultural countries (tea, coffee, bananas, beans, potatoes, etc.) so most locals are seen working in the fields as you drive by. Lots of manual labor, but not much farm equipment seen. Many goats and livestock are in front yards and often share the road as they're herded.

What was the Most Unexpected Thing: We had a couple vehicle breakdowns on bumpy dirt roads. People came out of the woodwork to help! I experienced a rather arduous and exhausting 6-7 hr. hike up the volcano into the Bwindi Impenetrable Forest in Uganda in search of gorillas, including an enormous Silverback.













In Rwanda, the baby gorillas often came very close to us out of curiosity, like young toddlers (but were discouraged by the guides). The little ones reminded me of human children. Sometimes the little guys would beat their chests and rough-house with one another. One female gorilla gently swatted at one of our female group members to "back off." The guides communicated with a series of guttural "grunts" that the gorillas understood. We kept our distance and respected their boundaries.

On the Ugandan trip up the mountain, there were only 3 of us (and about 10 guides, trackers, bushwhackers, porters, guards with rifles to scare off mountain elephants, etc.) That all-day trip was a "habituation" experience, meaning we were following the gorillas so that they would feel more comfortable around the guides and humans. (They are protected to avoid poaching and the rangers keep track of families.) Other than watching them, however, there was NO interaction with the animals. Masks were worn to protect the gorillas against colds, flu, viruses, and Covid. They are primates and 98% genetically identical to humans. There are only about 1,000 mountain gorillas left on the planet! Most live in the Virunga Mountains in Rwanda and the Bwindi Impenetrable Forest in Uganda; both remote areas I visited. The gorillas also travel into the Democratic Republic of the Congo (DRC) which shares a border.

Favorite Part: Standing in awe for hours looking at gorillas, photographing and watching African animals including elephants, giraffes, hippos, crocodiles, buffalo, antelope, hyena, lions, birds, etc. I traveled alone through both countries with a driver/guide.

Disappointing: Maybe the bumpy roads? (Which my drivers called an "African Massage.")

Would I go back: I would go back in a heartbeat.

Recommendations: Go!

The hope is that the program will not only prepare students for a wide range of career options but also equip them with the skills necessary to maintain their own vehicles for years to come.



HOW TO GROW AND KEEP YOUR MONEY

Something Happened, Now What? By Courtney Tacchini



We are often asked for advice on when to submit a claim or what will be covered. There are some circumstances that obviously require a claim (for example, in an auto accident with an injury or the total loss of a home due to fire). More often less extreme situations present application of judgment.

Determine the applicable deductible.

In non-extreme loss situations, a key factor is the applicable deductible. The deductible is sometimes referred to as the self-insured portion, that is the amount the insured pays before insurance kicks in. Obviously it's never a good idea to submit a claim if the amount of the claim is less than your deductible. The deductible for each type of coverage is listed on your policy declaration page. You will need to be able to identify what type of claim it is to know which deductible applies. Your insurance agent can help with that if you are unsure.

· Get an estimate.

Often we will recommend getting an estimate prior to submitting a claim. If the estimate is just over the deductible or able to be paid out of pocket, it is generally advisable to settle independently.

• Find out if it's covered.

If there is a question as to whether or not the loss will be covered, this is also important to investigate. While your agent likely will not be able to answer with absolute certainty (as claims are always subject to investigation by the claim representative), they should be able to give some guidance based on review of your contract and some details of the situation.

• Time is of the essence.

Any type of loss should always be discussed with your agent sooner than later. The more time that passes allows for additional damage to be done or could make circumstances more difficult to investigate.

The most important takeaways are:
1) start a dialogue with your agent right away and

2) give it some thought before jumping to the immediate conclusion that you need to submit a claim.



Scientists Invent a New Type of Battery – The Oxygen-Ion Battery

Researchers at TU Wien (Vienna) have developed a groundbreaking oxygen-ion battery, which boasts exceptional durability, eliminates the need for rare elements, and solves the problem of fire hazards.

Lithium-ion batteries, while commonplace in today's world – powering everything from electric vehicles to smartphones – aren't necessarily the optimal solution for all applications. Researchers at TU Wien have made a breakthrough by creating an oxygen-ion battery that offers several significant advantages. While it may not match the energy density of lithium-ion batteries, its storage capacity doesn't diminish irreversibly over time, making it capable of an exceptionally long lifespan as it can be regenerated.

Moreover, the fabrication of oxygen-ion batteries doesn't require scarce elements and involves non-combustible materials. The innovative battery concept has already led to a patent application, filed in collaboration with partners in Spain. These oxygen-ion batteries could provide an outstanding solution for large-scale energy storage systems, such as those required to hold electrical energy from renewable sources.

"We have had a lot of experience with ceramic materials that can be used for fuel cells for quite some time," says Alexander Schmid from the Institute for Chemical Technologies and Analytics at TU Wien. "That gave us the idea of investigating whether such materials might also be suitable for making a battery."

The ceramic materials that the TU Wien team studied can absorb and release doubly negatively charged oxygen ions. When an electric voltage is applied, the oxygen ions migrate from one ceramic material to another, after which they can be made to migrate back again, thus generating electric current.

"The basic principle is actually very similar to the lithium-ion battery," says Prof. Jürgen Fleig. "But our materials have some important advantages." Ceramics are not flammable – so fire accidents, which occur time and again with lithium-ion batteries, are practically ruled out. In addition, there is no need for rare elements, which are expensive or can only be extracted in an environmentally harmful way.

But perhaps the most important advantage of the new battery technology is its potential longevity: "In many batteries, you have the problem that at some point the charge carriers can no longer move," says Alexander Schmid. "Then they can no longer be used to generate electricity, the capacity of the battery decreases. After many charging cycles, that can become a serious problem."

The new battery concept is not intended for smartphones or electric cars, because the oxygen-ion battery only achieves about a third of the energy density that one is used to from lithium-ion batteries and runs at temperatures between 200 and 400 °C. The technology is, however, extremely interesting for storing energy.

"If you need a large energy storage unit to temporarily store solar or wind energy, for example, the oxygen-ion battery could be an excellent solution," says Alexander Schmid. "If you construct an entire building full of energy storage modules, the lower energy density and increased operating temperature do not play a decisive role. But the strengths of our battery would be particularly important there: the long service life, the possibility of producing large quantities of these materials without rare elements, and the fact that there is no fire hazard with these batteries."



Spring Home Maintenance Checklist - 5 Things You Should Check This Weekend - by House in Progress

Here are a couple tips to make sure your house is ready for Spring:

- 1. Clean out gutters: Clean any leaves, dirt and debris from your gutters and make sure that water flows through your down-spouts.
- 2. Check exterior drainage: Make sure that all sides of your house are sloped at least 6 inches for every 10 linear feet in order to keep water running away from your house.
- 3. Repair cracked paint: Inspect and repair any paint that is chipping or cracking on your siding or trim.
- 4. Inspect roof shingles: If possible, climb up on your roof to make sure your shingles are not missing, curling at the edges or cracked. Also make sure that all vent bibs are sealed and overlapped with shingles. If you are not able to climb up on the roof, a good pair of binoculars may be useful.
- 5. Trim overgrowth: Trim back any trees or bushes so that they are not touching or hanging over your house. This will prevent them from conducting moisture to your siding or roof.
- 6. Replace smoke detector batteries: Depending on the model, your battery compartment may be on the front or back. Slide the battery door open and replace with a new 9 volt battery. Make sure to hit the test button once you're done.



Michael has also worked closely with and photographed several high profile fundraising events around the nation for International speed painting Artist and philanthropist, Michael Israel.


In addition to Michael's experience photographing professionally throughout the United States, he is a mentor and teacher to other photographers locally and around the country.




